artistic boundaries, as well as creating opportunities and platforms for students to curate, exhibit and interact with art practitioners.




Developing Critical and Inventive Thinkers through Visual Communication

Developing Critical and Inventive Thinkers through Visual Communication is the Applied Learning Programme (ALP) of the school.

The programme aims to equip the students with critical and inventive thinking skills so as to prepare them for the opportunities in a fast-changing world. Through visual communication, the students explore the various possibilities of visual representations to bring across their intended messages. The programme develops their visual expression and language, as well as stimulates their creativity through photography.



In Term 3, the Secondary One students had the privilege of participating in special Art and Science lessons as part of the ALP. They experienced a series of hands-on activities which required application scientific concepts learnt creating an artistic product. These lessons enabled the students to learn collaboratively from one another and appreciate



photographs as a form of visual communication in the specially furnished ALP room. The ALP also included Education and Career Guidance talks by professionals in the creative fields, such as film directors and artists, to help the students appreciate the relevance and value of what they were learning.

In time to come, the programme will include level-wide as well as specialised activities for the Secondary Two and Secondary Three students.



Secondary One Learning Journey to Singapore Art Museum



In order to provide a holistic art education where the students experience both art making and art appreciation, the Art Unit organised a learning journey to the Singapore Art Museum for the Secondary One students.

The learning journey aims to expose the students to the various forms of art, as well as works created by local artists. The experience sparks curiosity and questions so that the students can find out more about the thought processes behind the artwork exhibited.

Secondary One Values In Action

On 24 May, the Secondary One students worked together to design recycling boxes to collect used papers as part of their Values In Action programme.

Aligned with the theme, *Care for the School*, each class not only designed a box for themselves but also another box for a class from the other levels. As part of the Secondary One Aesthetics Experience programme, a Hip Hop workshop was organised for the students to learn the dance. The highlight of the workshop was the Hip Hop presentation by each class during the F.U.N. Concert. During the concert, the students also put up guitar performances after learning to play the string instrument during the Secondary One Music programme.

This is the first time the school had a level-focused concert with performers and stage crew all coming from Secondary One and it was a great success.

Secondary Two Normal (Academic) Elective Modules

The Culinary & Baking EM was conducted by the Shatec Institute. The students were taught by practising chefs to prepare a variety of dishes and pastries in the professional kitchens in the campus.

In the Game Development EM, the students were taught how to design two games, namely the aircraft fighter shooting game and the pinball bouncing elimination game.

To round off their interesting and engaging EMs, the students were brought on learning journeys to the respective relevant industries to understand how they work and function.

Secondary Three iFly Experience @ Sentosa






